

MANAGER'S MESSAGE

Communication is the key to fullest understanding. With this in mind, we have replaced the Annual Report/Calendar you have received in the past with the "McCandless Town Crier". Published twice-a-year, it will contain more timely and current information of interest. We feel by keeping residents better informed your Town Government can heed citizens comments and react in the best possible way.

We are, of course, all personally interested in the continuing growth of McCandless. Our Town has gained deserved wide-spread recognition for its total environment; attracting new residents and businesses. Each Town Department has planned its programs and activities to keep pace with the ever-changing needs of the community. Most departments are highlighted in this issue.

Administration affairs of McCandless are conducted in the Town Hall. A staff of six — one to collect and record real estate tax; two, responsible for wage tax; one book-keeper and two secretaries; plus, two part-time employees transact all internal transactions. All taxes, exclusive of County Taxes, are channelled through the Administration Offices. Town real estate tax bills — sent out July 1st — total approximately \$8,500,000. Up-dated systems instituted in 1977 to combine School District and Town taxes in one bill have resulted in more expeditious processing and reduced costs. Computerizing Wage Taxes at the same time has increased efficiency in collecting current and delinquent taxes.

Town of McCandless Administration personnel are the residents source of information on all community matters whether relating to voting districts, zoning, refuse collection, permits or other items of concern. Comments and suggestions are encouraged.

ZONING HEARING BOARD

A three member Zoning Hearing Board is appointed by Council to rule on all Zoning Ordinance appeals. They make final decisions on challenges on validity of Zoning Code or Zoning Map; and, requests for variances, special exceptions; or, changes to other non-conforming uses. (The majority of variance requests involve alterations to existing structures.)

Board members — all McCandless residents are: George Russel, Chairman; Frederick W. Kieshauer; and Raymond G. Fleckenstein.

Town Council

Council members are the elected representatives of McCandless residents. They are pledged to act on all matters concerning the welfare of the community and its citizens. The seven-man Council membership is made up of three engineers, two teachers, one lawyer and a stock broker.

All Councilmen are members of all committees. This is very unique to municipal administration. It saves time and permits each member to have complete information on which to form an opinion prior to voting on any issue.

All residents may (and are encouraged to) attend Council meetings to better understand this vital governmental function and to be better informed of current happenings. They are free to comment on all matters brought to the floor.

Council Highlights—1980

JANUARY 7 — Town of McCandless board re-organized. J. Graham Crooks was elected President of Council; Robert J. Powers, Vice President.

JANUARY 28 — Passed Ordinance prohibiting left-hand turns into and out of Showcase Cinemas on Ingomar Road.

Guaranteed loan for McCandless — Franklin Park Ambulance Authority Building.

FEBRUARY 25 — Adopted Resolution to increase late payment penalty for real estate taxes from 5% to 10%.

By Ordinance, Town accepted streets in Brook Park Plans 1 and 2, and Greybrooke Plans 10 and 11 as Town streets.

MARCH 24 — Contract awarded to H.J. Snyder Company for rebuilding Mienert Road Bridge at a cost of \$87,615.

APRIL 28 — Appointed Edith Liquori to position of Administrative Assistant to Town Manager, effective April 22, 1980.

Ordinance adopted establishing 25 MPH speed limit on Gloria Street and portion of Old Perry Highway.

MAY 19 — Meeting held to discuss Flood Plain Regulations for certain Town of McCandless areas. Ordinance is scheduled to be adopted. Residents in these areas will then be eligible for flood insurance.

Contract was awarded to W. A. Burgunder, Inc. for the purchase of four (4) police sedans. Contracts were awarded to various companies for road supplies and materials. (Average unit price increase is 15% to 20%).

Contract awarded to Northern Industries, Inc. for the 1980 resurfacing and reconstruction program for five (5) miles of Town streets at a cost of \$407,193.

YOUR POLICE DEPARTMENT

Chief Patrick B. McCabe, with the assistance of three Lieutenants, heads the Town's 24-man Police Department. All Officers have completed the basic 480 hour Police Course mandated by Pennsylvania Legislation. In addition, many have taken special advanced courses; some are pursuing Criminal Justice Degrees.

The Town is constantly patrolled by four of the Department's six police-cars. Divided into 3 districts, each area is assigned a patrol vehicle while an additional car, with a Lieutenant, "floats" in support. The Traffic Unit, with three Officers funded through Federal Grant, have primary responsibility for enforcing Vehicle Codes. One of the Unit's members has recently completed a five-week Traffic Safety Course at Northwestern University. He is now, in turn, training the other members in basic through sophisticated accident investigative techniques. To assist the Traffic Unit in strictly enforcing speed limits, a recently purchased detector called Excessive Speed Preventor (ESP) is now in use.

Other specialists within the Police Department include a Youth Aid Officer and an Investigative Officer. The former provides liaison between the Town's Schools and Juvenile Court and conducts youth-oriented programs in the Community. One such program is an annual Bicycle Clinic. (Six were held this year.) The Investigative Officer follows-up and assists in all criminal activity cases. He is also responsible for directing Crime Prevention Programs. An unmarked police-car is used to assist both Officers in youth-aid, surveillance and investigations.

The Police Desk receives many questions concerning Town Ordinances. Following are answers to those most frequently asked:

1. Hunting is not permitted within the Town limits.

2. Discharge of firearms—including BB guns and pellet guns—is prohibited.
3. Dogs are not permitted to run at large. All must be licensed yearly, and certified to have had inoculations every 3 years.
4. Vendors must have a Town Permit and must carry this Permit while soliciting. Residents are requested to report all vendors or solicitors without Permits or those engaging in "pressure-selling."
5. Loitering is unlawful. This includes obstructing streets, sidewalks, entrances or exits of private residences, businesses or public parks.
6. Trail-Bikes may not be driven on streets, roads or highways. They are permitted to operate on owner's private property or property of other owners with written permission. Such permission must be carried on the operator at all times while on property of consenting owner. Parents are responsible for adherence to this Ordinance. Non-compliance is subject to a fine.

7. Of general interest—All newly installed or replacement traffic signs will bear new Federally Regulated symbols instead of the traditional worded type.

Etch -A- Pens for permanently marking personal belongings for identification are available, at no charge, to residents. They can be obtained at the Police Desk.

Chief McCabe is emphatic in stating his Department's desire to be of service to each Town resident. He urges each person to promptly report any activity deemed unusual or disruptive. Protection of persons and property is the Department's constant objective. Cooperation is the key to the continuing success.

PLANNING COMMISSION

Land use is of paramount importance to all Town of McCandless residents. A seven-member Planning Commission, appointed by the Town Council, reviews all proposals relative to land development.

The Commission is very active, receiving numerous proposals each year. Each is given fullest consideration. Typically, a formal proposal involves more than one meeting to be sure all areas of community welfare and criteria are met. In many instances the Commission makes on-site visits before recommending Council action whose decision is final.

RECREATION

Seven years ago, when the North Allegheny School District discontinued summer programs, a Joint Recreation Board was formed to maintain the vacation-time activity. The Board is made up of one representative from McCandless, Bradford Woods, Franklin Park, Marshall Township and the North Allegheny School Board. Gerard J. Aufman Jr. is the McCandless representative and serves as Chairman of the Joint Recreation Board.

Sponsored and funded by the four municipalities, the program is supervised by paid personnel. The summer programs—from June 9th through July 3rd—are conducted at Bradford Woods Elementary School, Espe Elementary School, Ingomar Elementary School, Peebles Elementary School, Ingomar Middle School, North Allegheny Intermediate School, Warrendale Park and North Allegheny High School. The latter is used for 2 two-week swimming instruction programs. All school facilities are rented from North Allegheny School District by the Joint Recreation Board.

The program is announced by notices at schools, the School District publication and the News Record. Over 500 students (mostly grade 1 through grade 8) registered for this year's program. Each pays \$1.00 for insurance purposes. All centers provide arts and crafts classes in addition to group activities such as games and story-time, plus special events days. Bike inspections, by McCandless Police Officer Miller, and a bike parade are annual events. Swimming instruction for grade 1 and grade 2 students attracted over 400 youngsters this year. Groups, divided by grade completion level, receive ½ hour lessons each day over a two-week period. Instruction is supervised by Mr. May.

A winter program for exceptional children at Cumberland School is also provided by the Joint Recreation Board.

AMBULANCE AUTHORITY



Flashing, blinking lights. The eerie wail of a siren. Sights and sounds so welcomed by those waiting for or being transported by an ambulance. To all the residents of McCandless they're comforting reminders of the efficient service provided by the McCandless-Franklin Park Ambulance Authority.

The Authority is headquartered in a modern 2,500 square foot structure on Grubbs Road, near the Town Hall. Operations were moved to this new facility on October 26, 1979. Providing better accommodations for personnel and equipment than its previous building, the Authority's new location is also more centrally located to better serve the community.

Making approximately 1,500 calls annually, the Ambulance Authority serves 7,000 subscribers. Annual subscription rates

are \$20.00 for family coverage and \$12.00 for individuals. Non-subscribers are charged \$60.00 per call. The Authority's annual subscription drive is now underway and it hopes to increase the number of residents now covered.

The Authority's three ambulances are Mobile Intensive Care Units costing \$65,000 each. They are equipped with the most modern lifesaving, life-support means that include cardiac monitors and cardiac drugs. In addition to other emergency medical equipment, each vehicle carries extraction tools for freeing traffic accident victims.

Authority personnel are all volunteers. They are highly qualified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) or Paramedics. EMT's complete a 3½ month course at Allegheny County Community College (funded by the county and state) plus, 3 months of on-the-job training before certification. Paramedics undergo more extensive training . . . 5 months of schooling and 1 year clinical training at North Hills Passavant Hospital. Paramedics are reimbursed for costs incurred, upon completion of training, by the Authority. (At least one Paramedic is on duty 24 hours a day.) Anyone wishing more information concerning ambulance service or serving as a volunteer should contact Mr. George Statton at the Authority.

PLANNING and ZONING

Development and property improvements within the Town of McCandless are carefully regulated by your Planning and Zoning Department, directed by Bill Nolan.

In an area such as our Town, which is attractive for both residential and commercial development, it is essential that growth be maintained within pre-planned parameters. Certainly tax base is a basic consideration. However, this consideration cannot subordinate a master plan designed to preclude helter-skelter growth. The safety of residents and safe-guarding of their investment are paramount in the everyday duties of the Department.

“Control” is the defined purpose of the Planning and Zoning Department. This is basically maintained through the issuance of required Permits and a series of inspections. At the present time new Building Permits, understandably, are at a minimum. The same prevailing economic conditions have brought about an increase in re-modeling and property improvement. The department would like to acquaint all property owners with Ordinances now in effect covering the most common property alterations.

STRUCTURAL ALTERATIONS—Permits are required for all additions and structural modifications. This includes anything attached to or within an existing structure.

SWIMMING POOLS—Installation of pools (above-ground and in-ground) more than two (2) feet deep require a Permit. Their installation must be inspected. Residents are urged to acquire Permits prior to installing or constructing pools so that all regulations are complied with.

FENCING—Permits are not required when installing fences. However, an ordinance does enumerate certain stipulations. Open air (80% voids) types, such as cyclone and split rail cannot exceed 6 feet in height.

ROADS and STREETS

Responsibility for road maintenance and storm drainage is shouldered by the Town's 22 member Public Works Department, headed by Superintendent, Mark Sabina.

Approximately 100 miles of roads are maintained year-round. Roads and streets are cleaned once a year or as needed. Pothole patching is done seasonally. Storm drains are installed and maintained on a regular schedule. All Department vehicles (including police cars) and equipment are serviced by 4 men assigned to keeping them in safe operating condition. Removal of debris and restoration of adjacent surfaces after paving are also performed by Town employees. Two Department members are assigned to Traffic Control; installing or replacing signs; making minor repairs to traffic signals; and, painting crosswalks at schools.

Winter is the time your Town's Public Works Department is most “visible.” During that time the crew is divided into two 12-man groups. Each is on call for a 7 day (Monday through Sunday) period. One truck is assigned to each of 7 districts for snow removal. Each district covers an area of about 15 miles. In addition to removing snow from all Town roads and streets, the Department also clears about 11 miles of State Roads including: Cumberland, Perry-

Stockade types have a height limitation of 4 feet. Height of privacy screens is limited to 6 feet and cannot be over 20 feet in length. Residents are advised to install fencing 4 to 6 inches off their property line. (Also, trees should be planted 4 to 6 feet off property lines and never within Town right-of-ways.)

SMOKE DETECTORS—All new residential structures must be equipped with smoke detector alarms.

DUMPING—A valid grading permit is required for clean-fill dumping within Town limits and must be done only where a Grading Permit has been issued. All other dumping (regardless of posting) is prohibited. Violators ARE prosecuted! The Town's agreement with our refuse-collector includes items other than “normal” rubbish such as old appliances. If you have any questions concerning what is acceptable, please call Vogel Disposal Service or the Town Office.

BUSINESS IN HOMES—Retail business cannot be conducted in private residences. Ordinances also prohibit businesses necessitating mechanical devices or machinery of any type. Businesses not requiring machinery or mechanical devices may be conducted if the business does not create an additional parking or traffic problem.

PREFABRICATED STRUCTURES—Building permits are required when placing prefabricated structures on private property. Included are tool and storage sheds, even though they may be temporary in nature.

FIREPLACES—With rising fuel costs, many residents have turned to auxiliary heating devices. All new fireplaces (free-standing or built-in) and heating stoves require Fireplace Permits and must be inspected prior to use. In fact, all vented heating apparatuses are included in current ordinances.

Although inspection and road maintenance is done by Public Works Department personnel, major and complete road paving is done by independent contractors. The Department, after inspection, recommends paving to be done. In 1980, the following is scheduled:

FIRE PROTECTION

Town of McCandless fire protection is provided by three volunteer companies—Peebles, Highland and Ingomar. All members have received training at the County Fire School in North Park. Some have attended the State Fire Academy—at their own expense—for specialized training. Basic equipment of the Fire Companies includes heavy engines, ladder-trucks, squad trucks and brush trucks.

Each company member has a monitor in his home. The monitor responds to a radio signal, transmitted from the McCandless Police Desk, when a fire is reported. The location of the fire dictates which fire company membership is alerted.

Because many of the volunteer firemen are at work during daylight hours, manpower is always at a premium. More volunteers are needed. Those interested are urged to contact Jim Arthur at Peebles Fire Dep't., Charles Keil at Ingomar Fire Dep't., or Jim Hough at Highland Fire Dep't.

All McCandless residents are encouraged by the Fire Chiefs to install smoke detectors in their homes. A fire-extinguisher should also be in every household. Next to fire-prevention, fire detection is primary in saving lives and property.

FLOOD INSURANCE


The Town of McCandless has recently adopted measures to safeguard property from flooding. The limits of the Federal Flood Insurance coverage have been increased from \$35,000 up to \$185,000 for residents of the Town of McCandless. In addition to the increase in property coverage, contents coverage has been increased from \$10,000 to the present \$60,000. Federal flood increases for small businesses and other classes of structures are also obtainable.

Information on rates and amounts of insurance available may be obtained from any licensed property and casualty insurance agent. According to the Federal Insurance and Hazard Mitigation Office of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, during the first 30 days after the Town converted to the regular phase of the National Flood Insurance Program, coverage will become effective the day following application, whereas there is normally a five-day waiting period. Under certain circumstances, this time period could be very important. The Town of McCandless was converted to the regular phase on June 18, 1980.

The Town of McCandless strongly recommends that anyone living in a flood prone area make the necessary application to obtain needed insurance as soon as possible. Maps showing these flood plain areas of the Town of McCandless may be seen at the Town Hall during normal business hours.

NORTHLAND LIBRARY

Northland Public Library serving the Town of McCandless, as well as adjacent communities, is an information center providing programs, concerts, and workshops to complement its collection of books, records, films, and magazines. Anyone living in McCandless is entitled to a library card. The library's hours are Monday-

Friday: 10-9, Saturday: 10-5 and Sunday: 1-5 (except during the summer Monday-Thursday: 10-9 and Friday-Saturday 10-5).
